 - 2. "belittled President McKinley" "hinted that the Spanish commitment to reform in Cuba was not serious" (Cherny)
 - 3. Published with title "Worst Insult to the United States in Its History"
 - D. The Maine
 - 1. Immediate report that the warship was destroyed "by an enemy's secret infernal machine", despite lack of evidence
 - a) "The Spaniards, it is believed, arranged to have the *Maine* anchored over one of the Harbor mines. Wires connected the mine with a power magazine and it is thought that the explosion was caused by sending an electric current through the wire." *Journal* (Brannen)
 - 2. Hearst personally offered \$50K to whoever would find the perpetrator, began drive for memorial
